"Havdalah," you may know, means "separation," and that is what the Jews faced when they encountered modern life in Berlin and elsewhere in Europe in the early 1800s. Due to the work of Moses Mendelssohn and others, the Jews suddenly had new choices. They could get a secular education, enter new occupations, do business with Gentiles and ascend to higher rungs on the ladder of citizenship. Inevitably, Jews found themselves separating from other Jews in making these choices in personal, family, religious and business life. I think you will see the dilemmas and challenges faced by the wealthy, prominent Mendelssohn family reflected in Jewish life today. I am grateful for the opportunity to share this story with you.

THE EMANUEL PLAYERS

Esther Aronson (Abraham Mendelssohn, Konrad Schleinitz) This is Esther's first time being part of the cast in a Ben Engel original play and she is enjoying the opportunity to expand her artistic range through these differing roles. She has been involved in many theatrical productions as a youth in her native Panama and as part of the Georgetown Gilbert & Sullivan Society while a law student at GULC. She last appeared on stage in the West Hartford Community Theatre production of "Mamma Mia!" pre-pandemic. In her spare time, Esther is a passionate tennis player, captaining several USTA teams and is an avid triathlete who has completed 6 full-distance Ironman races, among others.

Rabbi Steven Chatinover (Joseph Mendelssohn), a graduate of Brandeis University, earned a Master of Hebrew Letters and rabbinic ordination from Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion. He has been actively involved in the Jewish community since moving to Greater Hartford in 1982, including as Rabbi at Temple Beth Hillel in South Windsor, Middle School educator at the Solomon Schechter Day School of Greater Hartford, and as founding rabbi of Ohavei Shalom, a liberal, traditional, havurah-style synagogue. He was the recipient of a Grinspoon-Steinhardt Award for Excellence in Jewish Education (2005). He has been married to Leah Cohen Chatinover for 36 years, and is the proud father of Levi, Jacob and Nadav and grandfather of Caleb. Joining the Emanuel Players in 2016, Rabbi Chatinover made his first foray into acting since grade school, appearing as Rabbi Joshua in *Rabbi of the Stars*, and as King Solomon in *Philosopher King*.

Adrian Durlester (Director) is a freelance Jewish educator and consultant, a freelance tutor, substitute school teacher for Simsbury Public Schools and a performing pianist and song leader. He serves as choir director, religious school teacher, and bar/bat mitzvah tutor for Farmington Valley Jewish Congregation-Emek Shalom in Simsbury, and has served in musical/liturgical leadership roles for the Solomon Schechter Day School of Greater Hartford, Beth El Temple and Camp Shalom day camp of the Mandell JCC of Greater Hartford. He's a consultant to Jewish educators on implementing and using technology, editing Jewish textbooks, giving workshops and presentations, and other Jewish activities. Adrian has spent a significant number of years in theatrical production and management, covering the full spectrum - producer, director, designer (lighting, scenery, and audio), stage and production manager, technical director, musical director, et al. A native New Yorker, Adrian graduated from the Bronx High School of Science, and holds a BFA in theatrical production and management from the School of Design & Production of the North Carolina School of the Arts. He is also an accomplished musician and pianist, having studied 14 years pre-college first at The Juilliard School and then the Manhattan School of Music. He received his Master of Theological Studies degree from Vanderbilt University Divinity School in May 2000.

Elizabeth Ehrlich (Cecile Jeanrenaud, Costumer) is delighted to return to perform and costume another of Ben's spectacular plays. Elizabeth holds a BA in Theater from Wesleyan University and an MS in Organic Chemistry from Indiana University. Elizabeth is currently the owner and chief creator of Kids Kippot, an online shop for fun and creative kippot. Kids Kippot covers the heads of thousands across the world. Elizabeth would like to thank her family for supporting her in all her endeavors.

Ben Engel (Playwright) is delighted that his fourth play, like his earlier *Jacob and Esau, Rabbi of the Stars*, and *Philosopher King* will be a fundraiser for the Emanuel Synagogue, where he served as president from 1996-1998 and is a life member of the board of trustees. He is the president of Capital Classics Theatre Company, which produces the Greater Hartford Shakespeare Festival, and a former member of the board of the Commission on Jewish Education of Greater Hartford. Ben is counsel to the Hartford law firm of Rogin Nassau LLC, and formerly a newspaper reporter and editor.

Eric Hoffman (Joseph Lehmann) was born and raised in Brooklyn. He studied theater and creative writing at the University of Rochester. At Dell' Arte International he studied ensemble based physical theater, clown and Comedia Dell' Arte. Eric received his Masters in Educational Theater from the City College of New York and taught theater in New York City public schools for a decade. He is thrilled to be making his West Hartford debut with the Emanuel Players. He would like to thank his two children, Zehava and Judah, and his wife Hazzan Daniella Risman.

Mike Isko (Felix Mendelssohn) is thrilled to perform in another of Ben Engel's plays after appearing as Esau, in Ben's Jacob and Esau, as Rabbi Tzadok in Rabbi of the Stars, and as Yaravam in Philosopher King. Since his mother took him to an audition at the age of six Mike has always enjoyed time onstage. In college he had feature or leading roles in plays by John Guare (Cop Out) Sam Sheppard (Shooter), Athol Fugard (People Are Living There) and Ben Jonson (Volpone). For his college senior thesis Mike wrote and performed a one man show, A Nosh of Yiddish Theater, talking about Jewish migration to America using family stories and a compilation of monologues from the Yiddish Theater. Thanks to his involvement in Jacob and Esau, Mike is back onstage telling stories for Matt and Elysha Dicks at Speakup performances and as part of the Story City Troupe. Mike also played the role of Lazar Wolf in the GHJCC production of Fiddler on the Roof, and has taken improvisation and sketch classes with Sea Tea Improv.

Pat Kazakoff (Henriette Mendelssohn): Hartford Theatre experience has included the JCC's Fiddler on the Roof; Hartford Stage's Orphan's Home Cycle; Ivoryton's Best Days of our Lives, plus numerous Purim Schpiels as a director. She hosted a show on Channel 20, WTXX, where her partner was a puppet! She is host/producer of Shalom Hartford, on WHCTV. She is very much looking forward to being in a second production, written by Ben Engel, and directed by Adrian Durlester. L'chaim!

Alan Parker (Producer) has served the Emanuel Synagogue in many different capacities, as President, Life Member of its Board of Trustees, and on various committees at the Emanuel and in the greater Hartford Jewish community. In grade school, he played the Captain in Gilbert and Sullivan's "H.M.S. Pinafore." He was the co-producer of *Jacob and Esau, Rabbi of the Stars* and *Philosopher King* and is enthused to assist with Ben's latest original staged reading in support of The Arts at The Emanuel.

Ken Simon (Producer) is a graduate of California State University at Northridge (BA in English) and Western New England College School of Law (JD). Most of his thirty five-plus years of law practice has been in Criminal Law with many Jury Trials in Murder and Death

Penalty Defense. Ken said, "Those trials require theatrical performance. One weeklong Advocacy Institute I attended brought in a Hollywood Director to help us relearn language to help us speak to non lawyer juries. From childhood I was enveloped by love of theater and have shared that with my family. Seeing quality theater locally, in New York and London has always been a priority for us. It is with great pride that I helped bring Ben Engel's vision of *Jacob & Esau* to the Emanuel Synagogue." Now serving as president of Emanuel Synagogue, Ken also produced *Rabbi of The Stars* in 2016 and *Philosopher King* in 2018.

Mel Simon (Ferdinand David) returns to the Emanuel stage on the heels of his 2018 performance as Ahiyah in Philosopher King. Mel also played the role of Gamliel in Rabbi of the Stars (2016) and the American Dream in Central Connecticut State College's production of Edward Albee's play, The American Dream (1979). Mel is a Past President of the Emanuel Synagogue and a committed volunteer who has served as President of the Mandell JCC and JT Connect. Reflecting on his upcoming role as Fedinand, Mel said, that Ben Engel's remarkable script helps us to understand the ever-evolving world that the Jewish People have navigated through the ages and the need to be both open minded to change and rooted in tradition. When not appearing on the stage, Mel practices commercial litigation at the Hartford law firm of Cohn Birnbaum & Shea and enjoys seeing his three beautiful daughters take on the world.

Rabbi David Small (Rabbi Michael Sachs) is thrilled to join the cast and crew of Havdalah. David returns to the stage after a hiatus. In the Previously, David appeared in productions in Kansas City, Missouri, New Haven, Connecticut, Jerusalem, Israel and Los Angeles, California. Roles include: Fiddler (Constable); Bells are Ringing (Manager); Calamity Jane, (Wild Bill) I remember Mama (Uncle Chris); Auntie Mame (Ito), ApoupkolypseNow! Later, he acted in numerous high school and college productions and has been seen appeared in Hartford area local community theater. Offstage, Fred is a practicing intellectual property attorney, a member of the Emanuel Board of Trustees, husband to Eliana Tsukroff and father to their two sons Benjamin and Emmet, who both became bar mitzvahs at the Emanuel and both carry on the family theater tradition, starring in JCC, community and school productions. They have been members of the Emanuel since 2012.

Carolyn Topol (Narrator) grew up just outside New York City.
